Let Evening Come was composed in 2006 and premiered by the San Francisco choral group Volti, under the direction of Robert Geary.

Its setting takes its direction from Jane Kenyon's understated text, and her touching and heroic embrace of the coming night.

Kenyon was the poet laureate of New Hampshire and one of America's most celebrated writers. Much of her work is a symbolic and pictorial exploration of nature.

Let Evening Come was written for her friend and minister, Jack Jensen, at the end of his life. It is impossible to read her beautiful poem without reflecting on her own inner strength, faith and acceptance of the natural and human cycles.

Let the cricket take up chafing as a woman takes up her needles and her yarn. Let evening come.

Let dew collect on the hoe abandoned in long grass. Let the stars appear and the moon disclose her silver horn.

Let the fox go back to its sandy den. Let the wind die down. Let the shed go black inside. Let evening come.

To the bottle in the ditch, to the scoop in the oats, to air in the lung let evening come.

Let it come, as it will, and don't be afraid. God does not leave us comfortless, so let evening come.

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
